

## A Message from the President

On February 23, 2025, WPGS and the Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh held another fantastic Genealogy Day, featuring presentations and genealogical societies and libraries across the region. I am so grateful for the relationship between WPGS and the CLP's Family & Local History Department and that we can help host this fun and informative day.

Genealogy Day also included brick wall sessions. These sessions filled up almost immediately, evidence of the universal frustration all genealogists face at one time or another. I participated in two sessions with very different situations.

So, what qualifies as a "brick wall?" A brick wall is a seemingly insurmountable roadblock that halts research progress. It could be an ancestor who appeared (or disappeared) without any further records, an unknown maiden name, or conflicting information that you just can't resolve.

Here are some strategies to help break through those barriers:

1. **Review What You Know (or what you think you know).** Take a fresh look at your research. What information do you know about that ancestor? Where did the information come from? How reliable is it? I'm sure we all have examples of when we researched in the wrong location or family line because the starting point of information was faulty.

2. Create a clear research question and identify what types of sources may help you answer that question. If you can't find a birth, marriage, or death record, or if the record doesn't exist for the time and place, get creative. Look for alternative sources such as church records, newspaper announcements or obituaries, military service records, probate files, land, and tax records. For example, if you see a man move from "inmate" status in one tax year to the regular tax list the next, that is evidence he married within that year.

3. **Expand Your Search Beyond Direct Lines.** When records for a direct ancestor are scarce, research extended family, friends, and neighbors, as they can provide clues that may lead to missing information about your ancestor.

4. **Get a Fresh Perspective.** Ask someone else to review your research or give advice on the availability of records you may be unfamiliar with. Numerous Facebook groups dedicated to

genealogy, including the WPGS Facebook group, may be great places to ask for this type of assistance.

Spring is right around the corner, and now is a great time to refresh your genealogy research. Dust off those old notes, revisit past research questions, and explore new

resources—you may uncover the missing piece you've been searching for and break through your brick wall!

## **WPGS Library Collection**

The WPGS Library is a non-circulating collection of freely available materials to aid genealogical and Western Pennsylvania research. The library is housed in the Family & Local History Department (3rd floor) of Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh-Main, 4400 Forbes Avenue, Pittsburgh.

The library is open 9:30 AM-8:00 PM Monday through Thursday and 9:30 AM—5:00 PM Friday through Sunday. The collection includes hardcover books, paperback publications, and microfilm, as well as uncatalogued collections like the Family Surname File, First Families of Western Pennsylvania (FFWP) Records, Journals and Newsletter Collection, Member Ancestor Charts, Public Surname Book, Research Services, and Uncatalogued Microfilm.

The bookcase beside the WPGS Help Desk holds several large white binders with miscellaneous church information. These are not actual church records but may help locate churches when and where your ancestors worshiped. Items may include brief histories written by the church, anniversary celebration brochures, or newspaper articles. Each binder has a table of contents at the front. The material is organized by geographic area (Pa. or out-ofstate) and then by denomination. Additional notes on specific congregations may be available in vertical files in the WPGS office upon request.

Submitted by Dave Sherry on January 31: I was excited to learn that the records for a third of the parishes of the Diocese of Würzburg are now available at <u>https://data.matricula-</u>

online.eu/en/deutschland/wuerzburg/ with the rest of the parishes to be added by the end of 2026. German parish records at the Diocese of Pittsburgh helped me find my ancestors' hometown. Hopefully, they will join in making their records available online at some point, too. Response by William Dristas: Which church did they attend in Pittsburgh? The diocese just gave me great information about my 3x great-grandparents. They attended Saint Philomena's Church, which used to be in the Strip District. The church and parish no longer exist.

Response from Dave Sherry: St. Philomena was the mother church of all the German parishes. Almost all of my family's records were from St. Michael on the Southside.

Submitted by Debbie Reichert Wetlaufer on: I have Calvin MORLEY, who lived in Somerset starting about the 1830s as a transplant from Chenango County, NY. He was a blacksmith and later moved just over the mountain to Westmoreland County. He married Elizabeth BLAINE, daughter of Robert BLAINE from Somerset. Two of their sons, Leander and Isaac, fought with a U.S. Westmorland unit during the Civil War. Sadly, Isaac died at Spotsylvania. Leander survived the war, returned home, and married, but died two years later from the dysentery he picked up as a Civil War prisoner. I've done a pretty thorough job of tracing the Morley family, but I'd love to learn more about the BLAINE family!!

The well-known genealogy subscription company MyHeritage has just announced that they're launching a new service to



make collecting and printing family stories more manageable and enjoyable. This new MyStories service makes publishing a memoir as simple as sending an email. <u>MyStories</u> provides an easy-to-use system for collecting memories and photos over a year and then compiling the information to create an attractively printed memory book to keep or share. MyHeritage provides weekly interview questions, so the interviewee will always have a clear prompt to work from.

Unique but relatable questions such as "When you think of the word "home," what place comes to mind?" or "What's a place you've visited that took your breath away?" provide the perfect foundation to inspire someone to write down their memories.

<u>MyStories</u> works by sending a selected individual an inspiring weekly email with a question to answer about their life. The individual, whether you or someone else, responds to the email with a story and images they would like to include. When the interviewee completes the questions and gives the go-ahead, a hardcover memoir containing their responses and attached photos is printed for them.

Those who use <u>MyStories</u> can also access an online account to answer or edit responses and upload images that complement these stories. You may order the service for yourself or give it as a gift to another person. The finished memoirs are easy to share since multiple printed copies can be ordered.



The price of <u>MyStories</u> from MyHeritage is \$99. This includes 52 weekly emailed questions, one year of access to the online account for adding stories and uploading pictures, and your printed book.

If given as a gift, you will

pay \$99 once for the entire year. After one year, your recipient will still be able to edit stories and print their book but will no longer be able to add new stories or images. To send <u>MyStories</u> as a gift, order the service and choose "someone else" when asked who will tell the stories. You may choose a special date to send the service and a gift message. The recipient will start receiving emails on the date you assign.

Additional copies of the printed book can be ordered after it is complete. You can send the service to a parent to share with their grandkids, a child to record memories you may have forgotten or never knew about, a spouse as a special place to collect their personal stories, or a friend as a unique birthday gift.

## A Forgotten Piece of American Civil War History



The Sultana was a steamboat built in Cincinnati, Ohio, in 1863 at the John Litherbury Shipyard. Until the end of the Civil War, it traveled the Mississippi River between St. Louis and New Orleans, carrying supplies and news.

In April 1865, after the end of the Civil War, the Sultana was one of many steamboats charged with bringing home Union POWs from Andersonville and Cahaba prisons. They were being taken to Camp Chase in Columbus, Ohio, to be paroled. The soldiers boarded the Sultana in Vicksburg, Mississippi, on April 21.

A quick fix was being made to one of the boilers during boarding. Miscommunication and greed were two contributing factors that led to a riverboat intended for only 376 being overloaded with more than 2,000 people.

Around 2:00 AM on April 27, 1865, the Sultana was seven miles north of Memphis, Tennessee, when it exploded. Over 1,000 people lost their lives in this tragedy.

The Sultana Association was formed in the late 1980s and is open to all, whether you have a relative who was on board or not. Some founding members have no personal connection to the disaster, only a passion for the story. The 2025 Reunion will be held on April 25 and 26 in Knoxville, Tennessee.

The Association typically visits historic sites with Civil War connections and cemeteries with famous Civil War figures or those buried with someone on board the Sultana. At past reunions, people related to each other through a soldier or civilian on board the Sultana have met for the first time and forged new bonds.

Venango County, Pennsylvania, was featured in this 2025 episode titled *Dreamers One and All*, exploring the ancestry of actress Sharon Stone and model Chrissy Teigen. What was featured in the episode? Sharon Stone learned that her paternal great-great-great-great-great-grandparents came to Venango County from Ireland.

To turn up information on the celebrity's ancestors in the area, *Finding Your Roots* turned to the Venango County Historical Society for research assistance. Doris Eckel, a researcher at the Historical Society, in February, said the producers of "Finding Your Roots" sent an email inquiry to the Historical Society requesting "very simple research" regarding some wills and death records, with the promise of payment and crediting the Historical Society.

When she turned in what she had found, Eckel said, the research requests "snowballed from there and just kept coming." Over the next several months, Eckel said, she frequently communicated with Enrique Figueroa and his team at "Finding Your Roots," sometimes getting four or five emails daily. "They were very detailed, cautious," Eckel said. "It was amazing. ... Anytime I would send him anything, he would read through it right then and ask questions immediately."

Her quest for records led her beyond the Historical Society's collection to the Pennsylvania Room in the Franklin Library, where Sylvia Coast had already compiled much of the research she had been seeking. She also visited the Heritage Society of Oil City in the Oil City Library.

Finding marriage records, cemetery records, naturalization papers, wills, deeds, orphan court records, and other documentation that provided pieces to the puzzle kept Eckel busy. She was asked to find the earliest deeds for each of roughly a half-dozen early Venango County families. She also received requests for information about several local oil companies and what working at Polk State Center in the 1940s was like.

Ties to Cooperstown and Sugarcreek were found, Eckel said. At one point, she sent the producers of "Finding Your Roots" pictures of some graves at Pioneer Cemetery in Franklin. "The very last contact I had was in August; the

producer called and asked how you pronounce Raymilton," she said.

"Super cool," says Sharon Stone as she learns more about her family's Western Pennsylvania roots. The Academy Award-nominated actress and humanitarian is a Saegertown native and former Miss Crawford County.



Researching for "Finding Your Roots" was a first for Eckel, who estimates she spent about 20 hours working on it. "I don't know how much Venango County research will be in the show," Eckel said, and that she believes her research will be evident when a massive family tree is rolled out at the end of the episode. "It was fun, rewarding, and interesting," Eckel said of the project.

- <u>Dedication of the monument of the Sixth Penna. Cavalry</u> <u>"Lancers"</u>: on the battlefield of Gettysburg, October 14, 1888. Also known as "Rush's Lancers"; Officers and enlisted men who died 1861-1865: p. 31-37
- <u>Leaves from a trooper's diary 15th Calvary Experiences with</u> <u>the 15th Regiment, Pennsylvania Cavalry (the Anderson</u> <u>Cavalry).</u> "An account of the mutiny in the Anderson Cavalry, at Nashville, Tenn., December 1862" (by George S. Fobes)
- <u>Short account of the 30th annual banquet held at</u> <u>Philadelphia, October 10, 1902 - 15th Calvary.</u> Includes reminiscences of the Civil War and biographical sketches, with necrology and lists of survivors

#### **Additional Civil War Histories**

 <u>The Citizen Soldiers at North Point and Fort McHenry, 1814.</u> This volume intends to provide a factual and impartial account of the various Divisions, Brigades, Regiments, and Companies, along with the rank of every citizen who served their country on September 12th and 13th, 1814, at North Point and Fort McHenry. The information is taken from original rolls on file in the 3rd auditor's office of the War Department. Contains information about York, Pa. volunteers, attached to the 5th Maryland infantry, and Hanover, Pa. volunteers, attached to the 39th Maryland infantry.



## TECHNOLOGY FOR GENEALOGY

## How To Use Boolean Operators When Searching Online


Boolean operators form the basis of mathematical sets and database logic. They connect your search words together to either narrow or broaden your set of results. The three basic Boolean operators are AND, OR, and NOT.

#### Why Use Boolean Operators?

- To focus a search, mainly when your topic contains multiple search terms.
- To connect various pieces of information to find exactly what you're looking for.
- Example: second creation (title) AND wilmut AND campbell (author) AND 2000 (year)

#### Use AND In a Search To:

- Narrow your results
- Tell the database that ALL search terms must be present in the resulting records
- Example: cloning AND humans AND ethics



The purple triangle in the middle of the Venn diagram on the left represents the result set for this search. It is a small set using AND, the combination of all three search words.

Be aware: The AND is implied in many, but not all, databases. For example, Google automatically inserts an AND between your search terms.

Though all your search terms are included in the results, they may not be connected how you want. For example, this search: college students test anxiety is translated to: college AND students AND test AND anxiety.

The words may appear individually throughout the resulting records. You can search using phrases to make your results more specific. For example: "college students" AND "test anxiety". This way, the words appear as you expect them to be in the results.

#### Use NOT In a Search To:


- Exclude words from your search
- Narrow your search, telling the database to ignore concepts that your search terms may imply
- Example: cloning NOT sheep

•

#### Use OR In a Search To:

- Connect two or more similar concepts (synonyms)
- Broaden your results, telling the database that ANY of your search terms
- can be present in the resulting records
- Example: cloning OR genetics OR reproduction

The three circles on the left represent the result set for this search. It is a big set because any of those words are valid using the OR operator.



#### Search Order

Databases follow commands you type in and return results based on those commands. Be aware of the logical order in which words are connected when using Boolean operators:

- Databases usually recognize AND as the primary operator and connect concepts with AND first.
- If you use a combination of AND and OR operators in a search, enclose the words to be "ORed" together in parentheses.

Examples:

- ethics AND (cloning OR reproductive techniques)
- (ethic\* OR moral\*) AND (bioengineering OR cloning)
